

FMOSH Summary

- Research community / local / regional / games that add to a shared history through sport (includes a Living History). Young people interview: parents, carers, guardians, relatives and senior citizens, regarding their experiences playing games/ sports in their community.
- Exhibition of their research displayed in the community and uploaded onto the FOOTBALL MAKES OUR SHARED HISTORY (FMOSH) webpage. At the same event a designated area of play will be twinned (through a game / match / tournament) with Flanders Peace Field, Mesen, Belgium, site of the First World War, 1914, Christmas truces. A FMOSH Plaque will be displayed at the area of play; and a duplicate FMOSH Plaque will be displayed in Flanders Peace Field.

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
